## Into the Wild: Group Create a Metaphor Project

Due Wednesday, May 4



In the book we are reading, *Into the Wild*, Jon Krakauer admits that Chris McCandless was rash, but he insists he "wasn't a nutcase, he wasn't a sociopath, he wasn't an outcast. McCandless was something else -- although precisely what is hard to say. A pilgrim, perhaps" (85).

Your question: What precisely was McCandless? Use one of Krakauer's terms or invent your own metaphor. Choose your metaphor carefully, and note passages as you read. Your answer to the question is your central claim. Support this claim with evidence from the text and explain how the language of the quote -- the connotations of individual words in the quotes you cite -- prove your claim to be valid.

With your group members, you will create a presentation for the class. Your presentation needs to include images and text and needs to systematically support your claim that McCandless was a(n)\_\_\_\_\_\_. Remember, you create the metaphor, but your support needs to be a combination of quotes (minimum of 4) and your group's explanation as to why those quotes support your claim about Chris.
