Misplaced Modifiers

A modifier is a word or phrase that provides description in a sentence. Modifiers should be positioned as closely as possible to the word they modify—if not, things get confusing:

For example, the following have misplaced modifiers:

I found a silver woman's ring in the cafeteria. Is the woman silver or the ring?

Better: I found a woman's silver ring in the cafeteria.

Attached to the email, my boss sent me a file to work on at home. Is the boss attached to the email?

Better: My boss attached a file to the email, so I could do my work at home.

We ate our lunch while we rode the bus quickly. Did you ride quickly or eat quickly?

Better: We quickly ate our lunch while we rode the bus.

I only paid five dollars for the lesson. You only paid or the lesson was only five dollars?

Better: I paid only five dollars for the lesson.

Dangling Modifiers

Modifiers "dangle" when they have no clear reference. They usually appear at the beginning of a sentence, and cannot be fixed by just moving them to another place in the sentence. This is because they need a specific reference.

For example, the following have dangling modifiers:

With a cry of rage, the paper was torn in two. Paper can't cry!

Better: Julian, with a cry of rage, tore the paper in two.

When only two years old, my parents moved our family to a new town. Your parents were two?

Better: When I was only two years old, my parents moved to a new town.

With a loud yawn, the book was placed on the bed side table. The book yawned?

Better: With a loud yawn, Lacey placed the book on the bed side table
